#### **DID YOU KNOW**




What next with reporting, now that National Standards have been taken off the table?.

As you are aware, due to a Governmental change late in late 2017, National Standards are no longer in use nationwide. National Standards were brought into use from 2010. They mapped a linear track through primary school years in relation to our New Zealand Curriculum. According to the designers of the National

Standards, if a child was tracking along in relation to the National Standards, they were on track to make NCEA Level 2 at Year 12 of their schooling.

We now no longer use the National Standards linear achievement points to reference progress and achievement, however, the New Zealand Curriculum levels that they sat within still remain.



How we reported against National Standards in the Past: You will have noticed on the progress and achievement tracking sheets that we have published twice yearly as part of our reports for each individual student (see example of the top of the Maths Tracking Sheet here), the New Zealand Curriculum Levels have always been referenced across the top of each of our cumulative tracking sheet tables in a blue band. Within each table, a shaded box was used to show the National Standard reference point within each year level.

# How we will report against Curriculum Levels from this year and into the future

From the middle of this year onwards, instead of the shaded National Standard reference point on our cumulative tables, we have replaced these with a shaded band to show the New Zealand Curriculum band within which a child should be operating. You will notice these are shaded lighter at the edges and darker in the middle, showing that a

child can be working at an early stage within a curriculum level, strongly at a curriculum level or moving out of the curriculum level, into working within the next curriculum level.

These tables will now be embedded in the body of our school reports rather than being on a separate

sheet. In doing so we are aiming to continue reporting in a cumulative manner, showing you evidence of your child's progress and achievement in relation to the New Zealand Curriculum levels and having our reports in a format that is as user friendly as possible.

You will also notice when you receive your child's report, the information from previous years progress and achievement will still be displayed on these tables.

In summary, although the language around reporting has changed from 2018 onwards (i.e., we are no longer using the term 'national standard'), the information we share about your child's progress and achievement (and their previous year's progress and achievement) related to the New Zealand Curriculum levels continues to form the basis of information sharing at both mid year and end of year points.

# **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION CORNER**

**Current Religious Education Curriculum Content: The Holy Spirit – Te Wairua Tapu.** With the teaching of the learning objectives as shared below, we are working towards establishing a 'big picture' understanding through our lessons that **the Holy Spirit works within and through people**.

The following is an outline of your child's learning:

# Level 1 –Years 1 and 2

- 1) The Holy Spirit is God.
- 2) The effects of the Holy Spirit in people's lives.
- 3) People who believe in God can respond to the Holy Spirit in their lives in many ways.
- 4) The Holy Spirit is present in the Church

#### Level 2 - Years 3 and 4

- 1) The Fruits of the Holy Spirit and how they are expressed in the community of the Church.
- 2) The Holy Spirit as God's self-giving love enabling people to bear the Fruits of the Spirit.
- 3) The presence of sin is against the life of the Spirit.
- 4) Jesus' promise to His disciples to be always with them, how this is fulfilled in the coming of the Holy Spirit in the Church, in Word and Sacrament.
- 5) The Holy Spirit enables people to live like Jesus and come to know the Father.

#### Level 3 -Years 5 and 6

- 1) A variety of titles and symbols of the Holy Spirit Te Wairua Tapu.
- 2) The Holy Spirit as the bearer of grace, tapu holiness and mana power to all God's people.
- 3) Through Baptism the Holy Spirit brings people the grace to grow as children of God in the Church.
- 4) The indwelling of the Holy Spirit helps people to believe in Jesus and grow more like him.

To support your children in their learning at home, you could talk about where they have experienced goodness, kindness and sharing during the day and relate this back to the presence of the Holy Spirit in those around them, and, indeed in themselves as well.

For some other activities to work on at home here are a few ideas that you could try: Start a garden, cook a meal together, go for walks and find native trees, name them, play a game together, visit your local library etc. Any activity that involves learning in a fun, inclusive manner for parent and child will enhance your child's learning.

Please encourage your child to keep working on Mathletics activities and tasks set each week.

Years 4 to 6 to continue working on their RICH challenges

Students will need to bring their completed challenge to their class teacher by the end of second to last week of each term.

# **PE Uniform**

Please ensure that your child brings their PE uniform to school daily as they participate in some form of physical activity everyday.

Please name/label uniforms as it is very helpful particularly if an item gets lost.

- Please encourage your child to read the book / library book they bring home each day.
- Junior students need to bring back their readers back daily.
